DCRC: Faculty and Functioning

Ushering a new phase, presently the Centre has 28 fellows from different disciplines of social sciences. The fellows were appointed through a democratic and transparent process of selection. They are regular faculty and researchers across Universities and colleges and are placed for a period of three years from 2016-2019 on honorary basis. The fellows have expertise and specialisation in different disciplines of social sciences and are currently engaged with various research activities and projects at the Centre.

The Centre has thirteen committees including Library, Gender, Purchase, Web, Seminar, Annual Report, Infrastructural etc headed by different fellow conveners who meet regularly to deliberate on academic and research issues. The Advisory Committee headed by Hon'ble Vice chancellor is the apex decision making body of the Centre while the Fellow Council and Research Committee are academic committees. The Fellow council meets on the first working Friday of every month.

Major Activities and Achievements

Many academic activities including interactive discourses and academic interface were organised by the Centre in the last quarter.

Constitution Day, 26 November 2017

The Centre celebrated 'Constitution Day' on 26 November 2017 at the Centre. Students, scholars and Fellows associated with the Centre participated in the celebration.

The Constitution Day at the Centre began with the oath ceremony of the Preamble undertaken by all the participants. The students, scholars and faculty members pledged to undertake and imbibe the basic postulates of the Constitution in their lives.

Participants raised many issues focusing on the salience of the Preamble in all democratic societies and the need for balancing rights with duties to make the Constitution as a living, vibrant and sacrosanct document.

Interactive Discourse

The Centre organized an interactive discourse on the most current topic of national debate, 'One Nation, One Election' on 28 December 2018. The program was chaired by Dr Devender Kakar, Member of the Advisory Committee of the Centre. Speaking on the salience of the topic, fellows Dr Bhuwan Kumar Jha and Ms Shubhra Pant Kothari highlighted both opportunities and challenges for the country in going for one nation, one election task. The Director of the Centre, Prof Sunil K Choudhary analysed the issue from the perspectives of both manpower and money power and stated the

the Centre organized Eleventh Monthly Lecture on 31 January 2018 on the theme 'The Human Rights Discourse: The Significant Realm of the International' by Prof Shanta Nedungadi Varma, Department of Political Science, University of Delhi. Professor Shanta Varma explored both legal-procedural and thematic dimensions of human rights discourse while tracing the evolution of the concept in post-Second World War period. In her interesting and informative lecture, she further highlighted structural challenges to the human rights discourse including universality and cultural relativism debate, and issues of state sovereignty and self-regulation in the private sector. Professor Shanta N Varma and Professor Sunil K Choudhary also released dcrc Annual Calender Brochure 2018 which gives a glimpse of Centre's major activities and achievements in the previous year. Professor Bidyut Chakrabarty, Department of Political Science, University of Delhi also graced the occasion.





Foreign Visitor at the Centre

The Centre regularly host foreign visitors including academics and research scholars. In November 2017, Megan Bell, an American student from Dickinson College in Pennsylvania visited our Centre. Presently she is studying in India with the School for International Training's Sustainable Development and Social Change program which focuses on different Indian social institutions as they relate to sustainability. As part of her study project Megan Bell interviewed Professor Sunil K Choudhary, Director dcrc who specialises in electoral politics on how youth political participation manifests in India through youth civic engagement, the political efficacy of youths, and how information and political messages are disseminated among youth people and how that affects their voting behaviour.
